During this time of year, most of our members are in the process of renewing their membership. Many cards have been sent out in the mail already. Many of our members have been asking about some maintenance and improvements needing done around our cub house and grounds, such as filling in the holes of the access road, puddles in our pistol range, cleaning up the lake, and many many more. I want you all to know that the board hears your complaints, and we are working on some solutions. However, we need volunteers to help with the work load of maintenance on our building. Anyone willing to help, please let us know!

I'm sure you have noticed that asking for volunteers is a reoccurring plead. Our club cannot continue to run on membership dues and trap income alone. Our organization is approaching the 100 year mark. We have great facilities, and to keep them around for future generations, we really need our members to step up and help us out. We are one of the few clubs that do not require volunteer hours to be a member. We aren't asking you to

commit to running an event or dinner once a week, or even once a month. If each member volunteered to help to even 2 events or dinners each year, it would really make a huge difference in the well-being of our organization. Please come help us run some fundraisers.

While we're on the topic of improvements and volunteers, I would like to take a moment to recognize our gamers group. If you aren't familiar, we have a group of members who shoot chip games every Sunday on trap 8. They come in rain, shine, snow, no matter the weather. As a group, they have proposed a plan to fund and build 4 large pavilions to go over our picnic tables along our trap houses. They will be managing the fund raisers for this project. In the process of growing our member base and reaching out, we have considered what we already have in place. A majority of our members are men, and we have various youth programs currently set up and running. What we have neglected lately, and I think this goes for the industry as a whole, is women's shoots and education. I can honestly say, from hearing my daughter complain, the women's outfitters, firearms, and events aren't there nearly as much as they are for men. In my years as an instructor with the NRA and ATA, I have found that sometimes a different approach is needed, and to make sure you are equipped with firearms of the correct grip or length for the shooter.

I would like to see more women's programs started, whether it's a trap team or an education day. As an organization, we need to get the women involved. Get them shooting, get them fishing. Get them involved. Fundraisers will be planned to obtain funds to put on these events, and also to purchase firearms in a ladies model to use for education.

Many of you have been asking what will come of the donations from Veryl Turskey and the raffles we had from deceased members who wanted the money to go to the club for good use. All of those members really enjoyed the lake, especially Veryl. As a

board, we have made the decision to take these funds, combined with the left over funding from the lake committee for last year, and put that towards a good, sturdy dock. The club is in the early planning stages of this project. We are looking into various solutions. If anyone has any suggestions, please present those at our next membership meeting.

All of these topics are long work-in-progress type projects. Keep an eye on your newsletter and your email inbox for upcoming events, opportunities, education, and more.

The best way to help our club is to get involved. Come to meetings, come shoot trap, or just come and enjoy the outdoors. Again, If you haven't received your card it's probably because of the release form – get it signed and turned in!

Fishing Regulations

DAILY CATCH LIMITS are per Membership Card

Catch and Release only from May 1st to June 30th

Bass size limits: During the open season 2 Bass may be kept per Membership Card per day between 12" to 15". All other Bass are catch and release.

Bluegill, Shell Crackers, Crappie, and Perch: Limited to a cumulative total of 15 a day per Membership Card.

Catfish: Limited to 2 a day per Membership Card

WHITE AMUR NOTICE

The Amurs that have been stocked are grass eating and are to be **PROTECTED**. They are very similar to a carp, note the difference in the top dorsal fin which is long compared to the short one on the Amur and the carp has more of a yellow cast to it.

LONGNOSE GAR

There are at least six mature Gar in our lake, please destroy them if caught. Each Gar head turned in at the club house is a \$50.00 credit towards next year's dues!

SIGN IN INSTRUCTIONS:

- ◆ **PLEASE SIGN IN BEFORE FISHING. MARK DOWN THE NUMBER OF EACH KIND OF FISH THAT YOU HAVE KEPT OR RELEASED BEFORE LEAVING.**

- ◆ The Lake Committee needs to know how many fish are being caught and released for restocking purposes.
- ◆ Please pay for your guest(s) before fishing and mark "lake" on the envelope.
- ◆ Please take the time to go down to the range building and put the envelope with the money enclosed through the slot in the building
- ◆ The guest fee of \$10.00 is for the use of the club facilities for one day. This means that your guest can fish and shoot on the range all in one day for one \$10.00 fee.
- ◆ If your guest chooses to shoot and fish on the same day, mark the envelope "R & L"

Self Defense in Ohio

The following excerpts are quoted from the January 23, 2018 Buckeye Firearms newsletter. The full article is too large to include in our NLFG newsletter, so look it up online and read it all.

“Few, if any, threats to the Second Amendment are as insidious as the politician who says the right things about guns on the campaign trail, and who votes for innocuous gun bills, all the while working behind the scenes to scuttle more "controversial" pro-gun reform. In Ohio, for example, there are more A-rated members of the legislature than at almost any other time in the last 35 years. Add in a governor that was

endorsed by several pro-gun organizations and it should mean easy sailing for pro-gun legislation. Yet the self-proclaimed pro-gun stalwarts have failed to move a single bill since the last legislative session ended in 2016.”

“Ohio is currently the only state in America that requires a defendant in a criminal trial to prove that she acted in self-defense. Ohio’s requirement that the defendant prove self-defense is often referred to in legal parlance as “burden shifting.”

“Currently in Ohio, where deadly force is used, self-defense is a legally justifiable and complete defense where the defendant proves:

1. that he was not at fault in creating the situation;
2. that he had reasonable grounds to believe and an honest belief that he was in immediate danger of death or great bodily harm and that his only means of escape from such danger was by the use of deadly force; and
3. that he did not violate any duty to escape to avoid the danger.⁵

It has long been held as a fundamental notion of justice in this country that before someone can be convicted of any crime, the government must prove every defining element of a crime beyond a reasonable doubt.²⁵ This standard, by which we judge guilt or innocence, is deeply rooted in our history and tradition, the principles of which date back before the founding of our country.”

“The following hypothetical illustrates the point:

John Doe ambushes, assaults, and tries to kill Jane Doe in a parking lot. Jane has a firearm on her person. Actually and reasonably fearing her life is imminent jeopardy, with no safe way to retreat, Jane shoots John, killing him. No other person witnesses the incident. A police investigation ensues and for whatever reason, the government doesn’t believe Jane and she is charged with Ohio’s version of second degree murder. Jane does not deny she shot and killed John but does claim she acted in self-defense. In effect, Jane is

affirming the elements of Ohio’s murder statute, R.C. 2903.02: “No person shall purposely cause the death of another or the unlawful termination of another’s pregnancy.”³⁰

Jane’s admission that she shot and killed John is enough for the government to prove the elements of murder. The problem with this scenario, and what the police and prosecution don’t know, is that Jane is actually innocent and justified under Ohio’s definition of self-defense. Gone is the presumption of innocence, however, and Jane now has to prove her innocence in Ohio.

The trial begins, and evidence comes out that tends to show that Jane acted in self-defense. The prosecution and defense present their cases. During their deliberations the jury struggles with the two standards of proof they must apply, one beyond a reasonable doubt (to the elements of the crime) and the other a preponderance (on the issue of self-defense). The issue of self-defense is a close call for the jury, and the jury ultimately decides that while Jane came very close to proving her act was in self-defense, it didn’t amount to over 50% of the weight of the evidence. The foreperson of the jury announces their verdict: guilty. Jane’s life has been destroyed.”

“In conclusion, Ohio’s burden shifting frameworks needs to be changed for individuals to receive a fair trial in self -defense cases. Self-defense is a natural, pre-existing right of the first order and it should never be deemed a “gratuitous” or second-class defense by any state. In sum, Ohio’s burden shifting framework creates a chilling effect on self-defense, tramples on the presumption of innocence, renders the Fifth Amendment effectively meaningless, and creates an end-around to the government’s burden of proof beyond a reasonable doubt.”

“Ohio Senate Bill No. 180 and House Bill No. 228 solve the inherent problems. Under these Bills, as long as there is some evidence presented which tends to show the defendant acted in self-defense, the government would have to disprove at least one element of Ohio’s version of self-defense beyond a reasonable doubt. The government would not be required to disprove all elements of self-defense. The language in these Bills adequately balance the State’s interests while providing the necessary safeguards to protect the rights of our citizens in the State of Ohio.”

“Currently, in Ohio, there is no duty to retreat in one’s home, business, or personal vehicle, but there is a duty to retreat in other places, even if you have a lawful right to be in those places.”
